## Rutter's Requiem

Rutter's Requiem is one of the best-loved and most widely performed choral works from the twentieth century. This beautiful, thoughtful music setting comprises a blending of selected texts from the Catholic Requiem Mass and the Anglican 1662 Book of Common Prayer.

"The seven sections of the work form an arch-like meditation on the themes of life and death: the first and last movements are prayers on behalf of all humanity, movements 2 and 6 are psalms, 3 and 5 are personal prayers to Christ, and the central Sanctus is an affirmation of divine glory."

## Stations of the Cross

From the earliest days of Christianity, faithful Christians would go on pilgrimage to Jerusalem, retracing Jesus' final footsteps by visiting historical sites that were associated with Christ's suffering and death. Over the centuries these "Stations of the Cross" or "Way of the Cross" would be replicated to other places, allowing Christians to make their own pilgrimage closer to home. This Holy Week you are invited to make your own journey to the Stations of the Cross, contemplating Christ's deep love and sacrifice through the reading of scripture, prayerful meditation, and reflection.
