

"In this cinematic portrait of the forgotten Mississippi Delta, a coalition region of Together for Hope, the cinematographers follow the inspirational individuals who, despite challenging personal hardships, are determined to keep hope alive in their communities and turn the tables on the degrading narrative of rural poverty."

We'll watch the documentary across two nights of Adult Studies and conclude our viewing on November 17th with a discussion led by Jason Coker, President of Together for Hope.
